WHAT WOULD YOU SAY YOUR CHILD MOST ENJOYED AT CAMP?

- Not feeling, different, not being the odd one out and people not accepting you and having loads of fun
- My daughters own words "Just hanging around with her friends". She really enjoyed Legoland
- Meeting new people and making loads of new friends. He came home with loads

of telephone numbers and email addresses.

- The activities particularly Rock Climbing, BMX and Legoland
- Electronics and the food!
- Canoeing swimming

WHAT WOULD YOU SAY YOUR CHILD DIDN'T ENJOY and HOW CAN WE MAKE IT BETTER.?

- The only thing he did not enjoy was missing home!
- He felt a little homesick—not sure how you can change that. He was very tired from all the activities, he slept till 1:00pm the next day—unheard of!
- My son said camp should last longer

WHAT AREAS DID YOUR CHILD ENJOY AND WHY?

- She enjoyed the treasure hunt
- Legoland—Fun Rides, Ropes course—it was a challenge

My son (aged 12) attended Camp 2005 in July/August. Although he was apprehensive about going as he had never been away from home before he said he would give it a go and was thoroughly glad he did. He really enjoyed the whole experience there were so many activities for him to do many of which he hadn't tried and previously wouldn't even have attempted to try them, but he gave them all a go and it did wonders for his self esteem to achieve good results in them. As well as the activities I think the most productive thing our son achieved from camp was learning to open up and reveal his feelings whether they be good or bad and talk to others. He really bonded with his workers Matthew and John and said it was really nice having someone to talk to that really understood him and listened to him rather than lecturing him, which I as his mother, hate to admit but I do this and also his teachers at school.

Both XXX and myself cannot thank the organisers enough for arranging this wonderful opportunity and he is looking forward to attending Camp 2006 and any following.

The Camp is such an excellent opportunity for any child with ADHD or a co morbid condition to attend as it is presented in a structured fashion with many different internal and external activities which are what these children need.

I think any parent of a child with ADHD or a similar condition should seriously consider sending their child as it has literally been a life changing experience both for our son in the way he now views life and challenges and for me as his mum, who sometimes (most of the time!) struggles with his behaviour but the week break gave me a chance to re-evaluate the problems I have with him and also the chance to see how much I missed my son being around.

I would like to thank so much Steve and Adrian the Directors of Attention Seekers and also the helpers that attended the camp for helping my son and me in such a hugely positive way.



WHAT DID YOU THINK OF OUR STAFF?

We thought all the staff were very approachable and appy. Also very patient with the children and with the arents! The staff boosted his self esteem. It was so nice and it made such a welcome change

What our campers said about CAMP 2005

We believe that every child and their views count at Camp and we try to ensure all their needs and wishes are taken onboard. To do this we carefully pay attention to what they say about camp and we have a Camper Council that has elected members to give feedback to the directors when camp is on. This is a very empowering experience and this year Callum and Nick (two of our older boys) canvassed campers views. Here is a summery of what they said. "The campers really enjoyed camp and said the most important thing was making friends. They enjoyed many of the activities and felt the staff were friendly and supportive. Most of all the younger campers said they enjoyed Legoland and wanted to do more sports. Our mid age range of course wanted to stay up later and noted they had to learn to respect each other. They also loved the ropes course climbing and tuck shop. Our older campers said they felt they were treated as young adults with respect and understood that they were role models and liked this. They suggested we put price value on tuck so they had a daily limit not a choice between items, also they asked to bring there own films to watch on movie night". Both Nick and Callum intend to return to CAMP 2006 and take part in our leadership programme

THE QUALITY OF ORGANISATION & PROVISION, I BELIEVE, TAKES SOME BEATING WITH THE HIGHEST OF EXPECTATIONS YET IT IS PERCED, I FEIT, NOT FOR PROFIT, BUT TO SINCERELY & GENUINELY BE ACCESSIBLE & WORK FOR AS MANY AS POSSIBLE. THERE IS NOWHERE ELSE IN THE UK, THAT I KNOW OF THAT OFFERS WHAT ATTENTION SEEKERS ARE GROUND-BEGARING ON. IT MUST, MUST CONTINUE & RECEIVE THE SUPPORT IT TRULY DESERVES; TO HELP THESE CHILDREN WHO HAVE BEEN SOCIAL AS A RESULT OF A DISABILITY NO ONE CAN ISEE!

A number of support agencies visited **CAMP 2005** this summer, here are some extracts from their reports.

We were then invited to join the camp for lunch which was remarkable experience - each group of children came into the lunch hall and lined up picked up a tray and went round the corner to where the kitchen staff dished out dinners - there was the choice of 2 main meals of which on this day included Cornish pasty with vegetables or sweet and sour stir fry - there was also a large choice of salad - quiche - cheese - ham and a number of different yoghurts and deserts. As one group finished and sat down at a table the next group arrived and lined up and went through. All the children were very well behaved and queued very sensibly and went to sit at the table in very sensible manner and very quietly too it was truly amazing... It was obvious that the older children had taken on responsibility roles for helping to look after the younger children and they were also using video cameras filming various activities and they were interviewing other members of their group - they I really were amazing in that this was all done of their own accord!

All the staff were amazing and showed to be full of confidence and support and respect to the children in their care and this shone through not only them but the children also there was mutual respect and confidence - the staff did not just tell the children what to do they would ask them very politely to do things and this really did pay off in that the children would do what they were asked and if they wanted to ask staff for anything then they were all polite and respectful to all staff and also to us as visitors.
